2. Growth inhibition study aquatic plants (Annex VII, Section 9.1.2.; test method: EU C.3./OECD TG 201).

Information required from all the Registrants subject to Annex VIII of REACH

3. Long-term toxicity testing on fish, also requested below (triggered by Annex VIII, Section 9.1.3., Column 2).

Information required from all the Registrants subject to Annex IX of REACH

4. Long-term toxicity testing on aquatic invertebrates (Annex IX, Section 9.1.5.; test method: EU C.20./OECD TG 211);
5. Long-term toxicity testing on fish (Annex IX, Section 9.1.6.; test method: EU C.47./OECD TG 210).

The reasons for the request(s) are explained in Appendix 1.

Information required depends on your tonnage band

You must provide the information listed above for all REACH Annexes applicable to you in accordance with Articles 10(a) and 12(1) of REACH. The addressee of the decision and its corresponding information requirements based on registered tonnage band are listed in Appendix 3.

In the requests above, the same study has been requested under different Annexes. This is because some information requirements may be triggered at lower tonnage band(s). In such cases, only the reasons why the information requirement is triggered are provided for the lower tonnage band(s). For the highest tonnage band, the reasons why the standard information requirement is not met and the specification of the study design are provided. Only one study is to be conducted; all registrants concerned must make every effort to reach an agreement as to who is to carry out the study on behalf of the others under Article 53 of REACH.

How to comply with your information requirements

To comply with your information requirements, you must submit the information requested by this decision in an updated registration dossier by the deadline indicated above. You must also **update the chemical safety report, where** relevant, including any changes to classification and labelling, based on the newly generated information.

You must follow the general requirements for testing and reporting new tests under REACH, see Appendix 4.

Appeal

This decision, when adopted under Article 51 of REACH, may be appealed to the Board of Appeal of ECHA within three months of its notification to you. Please refer to <http://echa.europa.eu/regulations/appeals> for further information.

Failure to comply

If you do not comply with the information required by this decision by the deadline indicated above, ECHA will notify the enforcement authorities of your Member State.

Reasons related to the information under Annex VII of REACH

1. Long-term toxicity testing on aquatic invertebrates

1 Short-term toxicity testing on aquatic invertebrates is an information requirement under Annex VII, Column 1, Section 9.1.1. However, under Column 2, long-term toxicity testing on aquatic invertebrates may be required by the Agency if the substance is poorly water soluble, i.e. solubility below 1 mg/L.

1.1. Triggering of the information requirement

2 Poorly water soluble substances require longer time to reach steady-state conditions. As a result, the short-term tests do not give a true measure of toxicity for this type of substances and the long-term test is required.

3 In the provided OECD TG 105 study (2012), the saturation concentration of the Substance in water was determined to be below the limit of detection of the analytical method (i.e. 5.1 mg/L). In your dossier under section 5.1.2, you state that "*...It is, therefore, considered to be appropriate to treat the substance as if the water solubility of the substance had been determined at a distinct concentration at or below 1 mg/L. The conclusion that the substance is highly insoluble is, therefore, appropriate and valid.*"

4 In addition, ECHA has assessed the water solubilities of the constituents of the Substance reported in your dossier using the public version of WSKOW in EPISUITE. The WSKOW model predictions showed that all the constituents reported in your dossier are poorly water soluble (<1 mg/L).

5 Therefore, the Substance is poorly water soluble and information on long-term toxicity on aquatic invertebrates must be provided.

1.2. Information requirement not fulfilled

6 The information provided, its assessment and the specifications of the study design are addressed under request 4.

7 In the comments to the draft decision, you agree to perform the requested study.

2. Growth inhibition study aquatic plants

8 Growth inhibition study on aquatic plants is an information requirement under Annex VII to REACH (Section 9.1.2.).

2.1. Information provided

9 You have provided an OECD 201 study (2012) with the Substance.

2.2. Assessment of the information provided

10 To fulfil the information requirement, a study must comply with the OECD TG 201 and the specification(s) of the OECD GD 23 if the substance is difficult to test (Article 13(3) of REACH). Therefore, the following specification(s) must be met:

Technical specifications impacting the sensitivity/reliability of the test

- a) at least 6 treatment replicates are included if a limit test (at 100 mg/L or at the limit of solubility of the test substance) is conducted;

Characterisation of exposure

- b) analytical monitoring must be conducted. For UVCBs, chemical specific analysis of the test solution is required to demonstrate attainment of equilibrium and stability during the test. Alternatively, a justification why specific analytical monitoring of exposure concentrations is not technically feasible must be provided.;
- c) the results can be based on nominal concentration only if the concentration of the test material has been maintained within ± 20 % of the nominal concentration throughout the test.

Reporting of the methodology and results

- d) the results of algal biomass determined in each flask at least daily during the test period are reported in a tabular form;

11 In the study provided:

Technical specifications impacting the sensitivity/reliability of the test

- a) the study corresponds to a limit test and the number of treatment replicates was 3;

Characterisation of exposure

- b) dissolved organic carbon (DOC) was used for analytical monitoring of exposure concentrations;
- c) you have expressed the effect values based on nominal concentrations;

Reporting of the methodology and results

- d) tabulated data on the algal biomass determined daily for each treatment group and control are not reported;

12 Based on the above, there are critical methodological deficiencies resulting in the rejection of the study results. More specifically, the study did not contain enough replicates to confirm the reliability of the results (a). Furthermore, DOC is not a substance specific method for analytical monitoring of exposure concentrations and you have not provided any justification why chemical specific analysis is not feasible. Since the Substance is UVCB with poorly water soluble constituents, difficulties in achieving and maintaining test concentrations can be expected. In the absence of chemical specific analysis (b), you have not provided confirmation that exposures were within ± 20 % of the nominal concentrations throughout the test. Therefore, the reported effect values based on nominal concentrations are considered not reliable (c). Furthermore, the reporting of the study is not sufficient to conduct an independent assessment of its reliability (d). More specifically, you did not provide tabulated data.

13 On this basis, the specification(s) of OECD TG 201 are not met and the information requirement is not fulfilled.

2.3. Study design and test specifications

14 The Substance is difficult to test due to the low water solubility (<1 mg/L). The OECD TG 201 specifies that, for difficult to test substances, you must consider the approach described in the OECD GD 23 or other approaches, if more appropriate for your substance. In all cases, the approach selected must be justified and documented. Due to the properties of Substance, it may be difficult to achieve and maintain the desired exposure concentrations.

Therefore, you must monitor the test concentration(s) of the Substance throughout the exposure duration and report the results. If it is not possible to demonstrate the stability of exposure concentrations (i.e. measured concentration(s) not within 80-120% of the nominal concentration(s)), you must express the effect concentration based on measured values as described in the OECD TG 201. In case a dose-response relationship cannot be established (no observed effects), you must demonstrate that the approach used to prepare test solutions was adequate to maximise the concentration of the Substance in the test solution.

- 15 For multi-constituents/UVCBs, the analytical method must be adequate to monitor qualitative and quantitative changes in exposure to the dissolved fraction of the test material during the test (e.g. by comparing mass spectral full-scan GC or HPLC chromatogram peak areas or by using targeted measures of key constituents or groups of constituents).
- 16 If you decide to use the Water Accommodated Fraction (WAF) approach, in addition to the above, you must:
 - use loading rates that are sufficiently low to be in the solubility range of most constituents (or that are consistent with the PEC value). This condition is mandatory to provide relevant information for the hazard and risk assessment (Guidance on IRs and CSA, Appendix R.7.8.1-1, Table R.7.8-3);
 - provide a full description of the method used to prepare the WAF (including, among others, loading rates, details on the mixing procedure, method to separate any remaining non-dissolved test material including a justification for the separation technique);
 - prepare WAFs separately for each dose level (i.e. loading rate) and in a consistent manner.
- 17 In the comments to the draft decision, you agree to perform the requested study.

Reasons related to the information under Annex VIII of REACH

3. Long-term toxicity testing on fish

18 Short-term toxicity testing on fish is an information requirement under Annex VIII, Column 1, Section 9.1.3. However, long-term toxicity testing on fish may be required by the Agency (Section 9.1.3., Column 2) if the substance is poorly water soluble, i.e. solubility below 1 mg/L.

3.1. Triggering of the information requirement

19 Poorly water soluble substances require longer time to reach steady-state conditions. As a result, the short-term tests do not give a true measure of toxicity for this type of substances and the long-term test is required.

20 As already explained in request 1, the Substance is poorly water soluble and information on long-term toxicity on fish must be provided.

3.2. Information requirement not fulfilled

21 The information provided, its assessment and the specifications of the study design are addressed under request 5.

22 In the comments to the draft decision, you agree to perform the requested study.

Reasons related to the information under Annex IX of REACH

4. Long-term toxicity testing on aquatic invertebrates

23 Long-term toxicity testing on aquatic invertebrates is an information requirement under Annex IX to REACH (Section 9.1.5.).

4.1. Information provided

24 You have adapted this information requirement by using Column 2 of Annex IX, Section 9.1. To support the adaptation, you have provided following information: *"According to REACH regulation Annex IX, Column 2, long-term toxicity testing shall only be proposed by the registrant if the chemical safety assessments indicates the need for further investigation. However, acute toxicity was not determined up to 100 mg/L and, therefore, no long-term testing appears to be needed."*

4.2. Assessment of the information provided

25 Under Annex IX, Section 9.1., Column 2 is not a basis for omitting information on long-term toxicity to aquatic invertebrates referred to under Column 1, Section 9.1.5.

26 Your adaptation is therefore rejected and the information requirement is not fulfilled.

4.3. Study design and test specifications

27 The OECD TG 211 specifies that, for difficult to test substances, the OECD GD 23 must be followed. As already explained above, the Substance is difficult to test. Therefore, you must fulfil the requirements described in 'Study design and test specifications' under request 2.

28 In the comments to the draft decision, you agree to perform the requested study.

5. Long-term toxicity testing on fish

29 Long-term toxicity testing on fish is an information requirement under Annex IX to REACH (Section 9.1.6.).

5.1. Information provided

30 You have adapted this information requirement by using Column 2 of Annex IX, Section 9.1. To support the adaptation, you have provided following information: *"According to REACH regulation Annex IX, Column 2, long-term toxicity testing shall only be proposed by the registrant if the chemical safety assessments indicates the need for further investigation. However, acute toxicity was not determined up to 100 mg/L and, therefore, no long-term testing appears to be needed."*

5.2. Assessment of the information provided

31 Under Annex IX, Section 9.1., Column 2 is not a basis for omitting information on long-term toxicity to fish referred to under Column 1, Section 9.1.6.

32 Your adaptation is therefore rejected and the information requirement is not fulfilled.

5.3. Study design and test specifications

- 33 To fulfil the information requirement for the Substance, the Fish, Early-life Stage Toxicity Test (test method OECD TG 210) is the most appropriate (Guidance on IRs and CSA, Section R.7.8.2.).
- 34 The OECD TG 210 specifies that, for difficult to test substances, the OECD GD 23 must be followed. As already explained above, the Substance is difficult to test. Therefore, you must fulfil the requirements described in "Study design and test specifications" under request 2.
- 35 In the comments to the draft decision, you agree to perform the requested study.

Appendix 2: Procedure

This decision does not prevent ECHA from initiating further compliance checks at a later stage on the registrations present.

ECHA followed the procedure detailed in Articles 50 and 51 of REACH.

The compliance check was initiated on 01 February 2022.

The deadline of the decision is set based on standard practice for carrying out OECD TG tests. It has been exceptionally extended by 12 months from the standard deadline granted by ECHA to take into account currently longer lead times in contract research organisations.

In your comments on the draft decision, you requested an extension of the deadline to provide information from 24 to 30 months from the date of adoption. You considered that the extension of 6 months is needed due to the extra time needed to synthesise the test material in an external laboratory and to develop a suitable analytical method for the Substance. Based on the documentary evidence provided, ECHA has agreed with your request for a deadline extension and has extended the deadline to 30 months.

ECHA notified the draft decision to the competent authorities of the Member States for proposals for amendment.

As no amendments were proposed, ECHA adopted the decision under Article 51(3) of REACH.

Appendix 3: Addressee(s) of this decision and their corresponding information requirements

In accordance with Articles 10(a) and 12(1) of REACH, the information requirements for individual registrations are defined as follows:

- the information specified in Annex VII to REACH, for registration at 1-10 tonnes per year (tpa), or as a transported isolated intermediate in quantity above 1000 tpa;
- the information specified in Annexes VII and VIII to REACH, for registration at 10-100 tpa;
- the information specified in Annexes VII, VIII and IX to REACH, for registration at 100-1000 tpa;
- the information specified in Annexes VII to X to REACH, for registration at more than 1000 tpa.

Appendix 4: Conducting and reporting new tests for REACH purposes

1. Requirements when conducting and reporting new tests for REACH purposes

1.1. Test methods, GLP requirements and reporting

- 1) Under Article 13(3) of REACH, all new data generated as a result of this decision must be conducted according to the test methods laid down in a European Commission Regulation or to international test methods recognised by the Commission or ECHA as being appropriate.
- 2) Under Article 13(4) of REACH, ecotoxicological and toxicological tests and analyses must be carried out according to the GLP principles (Directive 2004/10/EC) or other international standards recognised by the Commission or ECHA.
- 3) Under Article 10(a)(vi) and (vii) of REACH, all new data generated as a result of this decision must be reported as study summaries, or as robust study summaries, if required under Annex I of REACH. See ECHA Practical Guide on How to report robust study summaries².
- 4) Under the introductory part of Annexes VII/VIII/IX/X to REACH, where a test method offers flexibility in the study design, for example in relation to the choice of dose levels or concentrations, the chosen study design must ensure that the data generated are adequate for hazard identification and risk assessment.

1.2. Test material

(1) Selection of the Test material(s)

The Test Material used to generate the new data must be selected taking into account the following:

- the boundary composition(s) of the Substance,
- the impact of each constituent/ impurity on the test results for the endpoint to be assessed. For example, if a constituent/ impurity of the Substance is known to have an impact on (eco)toxicity, the selected Test Material must contain that constituent/ impurity.

(2) Information on the Test Material needed in the updated dossier

- You must report the composition of the Test Material selected for each study, under the "Test material information" section, for each respective endpoint study record in IUCLID.
- The reported composition must include the careful identification and description of the characteristics of the Tests Materials in accordance with OECD GLP (ENV/MC/CHEM(98)16) and EU Test Methods Regulation (EU) 440/2008 (Note, Annex), namely all the constituents must be identified as far as possible as well as their concentration. Also any constituents that have harmonised classification and labelling according to the CLP Regulation must be identified and quantified using the appropriate analytical methods,

With that detailed information, ECHA can confirm whether the Test Material is relevant for the Substance.
